

Social Science Graduate Enrollment (2021-2022)




- 13 PhD programs; 18 MA programs (Research); 1 MA (Professional)
- PhD: 51%; MA (Research): 40%; MA (Professional): 9%
 - PhD: 216 students (87% Domestic; 13% International)
 - MA (Research): 173 students (85% Domestic; 15 % International)
 - MA (Professional): 38 students: (95% Domestic; 5% International)
- Unique: 1-year MA with Master Research Paper (MRP)



Sources of Graduate Funding in the Social Sciences


% of Total Compensation



- Employment (Teaching assistantships and RA in lieu of TA) 43%
- SGS Scholarship Fund and other Department Sources 25%
- Competitive Internal and External Scholarships 24%
- Faculty Research Grants 7%
- Bursaries, based on need 1%

- In-time PhD Minimum stipend for F23 is \$17,500 over tuition for all students
- Funding packages are not standardized across programs



Conclusions

- FSS supports a large number of PhD students
- Funding for PhD students predominantly comes from employment, SGS scholarships, and external/internal scholarships
- Like other Social Science programs across Canada, FSS is unique among faculties at McMaster in offering an intensive 1-year Research MA program with a Master Research Paper
- The funding mix varies substantially across departments
