University Funding Highlights

Tuition

 Tuition was rolled back 10% in 2019-2020, subsequently frozen


Government Grants

Operating grant has been flat since 2016-2017

Donor Funds

 These are often locked and not at the discretion of a university unit

Sources of Graduate Funding

- Competitive internal and external scholarships
- School of Graduate Studies Scholarship Fund and other departmental sources
- Research grants and contracts, primarily these are provided through research funds secured by the supervisor
- Bursaries, based on need.
- Academic grants, based on need and academic merit
- McMaster employment, primarily Teaching and Research Assistantships
- Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP)

Distribution of Funding


- Funding varies by Faculty and by department
- Faculties, departments decide how to allocate funds to Masters and PhD students


2003

- Canada's grants for Masters and PhD students have not increased since 2003.
- The Canada Graduate Scholarships are provided by three federal research funding agencies.

Example of how funding varies across McMaster






Aggregate Data on Graduate Funding

Full figures posted on the Task Force's website

- Students may also receive additional fellowships, scholarships, and bursaries that are not administered by McMaster
- 3% of in-time PhD students received near the minimum compensation net of tuition of between \$13,500 and \$15,500 in 2021-22
- Most Faculties are in the \$22K-\$23K range of median funding for in-time/full time PhD net of tuition



Financial Struggles

 Graduate students feel pressure to balance studies and research work, often with employment inside and outside of McMaster

5 Key Themes: Roundtables + Online



Transparency | Communication & Action

- Graduate students reported having difficulty finding information on funding
- For example, offer letters must be continually reviewed to ensure clarity on funding provided, duration of funding and that they contain links to current information on cost of living in Hamilton

5 Key Themes: Roundtables + Online

International Students | Additional Barriers



- International students add to our research capacity and to the richness, diversity of graduate programs
- These students often do not have a network of support in Canada

Consultation Themes Cont'd

Policies: Major Scholarships and Total Funding

- Often termed "clawback"
- Wide variety of approaches per Faculty and often per program
- Clarity on policy is essential

Four-Year Model for PhD Students

- Provincial funding is tied to timeline
- Carefully examine curricula to ensure it remains streamlined and does not pose a barrier to timely completion

Current Actions

- Removal of limits should students desire more on-campus employment
- Increasing awareness of emergency bursary funds for non-tuition issues
- Review of offer letters to improve linkage to external information guides to help students understand funding package
- Greater communication and regular touchpoints with graduate students
- Provost-funded project to explore a shorter PhD curricula in Humanities

Next for the Task Force

- Aggregate data will be regularly updated and made public
- Ongoing consultations with McMaster's graduate community
- Feedback will act as the basis of recommendations formulated by the Task Force
- Final report with recommendations to Provost and Graduate Council

Sept. 1

Effective September 1, the minimum funding for full-time/in-time PhD students will be raised to \$17.5k+tuition from \$13.5k+tuition

This will benefit 7% of PhD students
